


## MR. SQUAREFACE

The name "Quan Mặt Dzuông" (literally "Square-Faced Mandarin") is inspired by the traditional East Asian concept of the square-shaped face - a symbol of wisdom, integrity, and virtue. It also reflects the image of mandarins and align with the character and visual concept explored in this project.

They were successful in stabilizing the population's wellbeing and securing their boundaries. They were revered by the populace and regarded as the God Emperor in the village after their passing.

Tien Si Giay is typically shown with a hat pin (Hoa Cài Mũ), a handheld card (Thẻ Cầm Tay), wearing the Trang Nguyen hat (Mão Trạng Nguyên), and a colorful robe (Áo Bào). Taking inspiration from the mandarin's outfit from the Nguyen Dynasty ensures a reliable and highly detailed source of historical references. This project centers on an in-depth study of the First-Rank Primary Civil Mandarin, based on the 1845 official dress codification issued under the reign of Emperor Thiệu Trị.

This codification remains the most comprehensive and well-documented dress code in the history of the Nguyễn dynasty and the Vietnamese imperial system. The design blends traditional inspiration with contemporary expression, bringing cultural stories to life for today's youth and celebrating the beauty of Vietnamese heritage.
