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My competition piece, created as part of my second-year tailoring project, is a tailored blazer inspired by my Portuguese grandfather, Avo Antonio. I'm proud of my dual British and Portuguese heritage, and I aim to bring this cultural richness into my designs.

Avo Antonio's life: from his service as a mounted police officer in Portugal and Germany to running our family farm has always inspired me. Summers spent working on the farm in Portugal have shaped my understanding of durability, practicality, and craftsmanship.

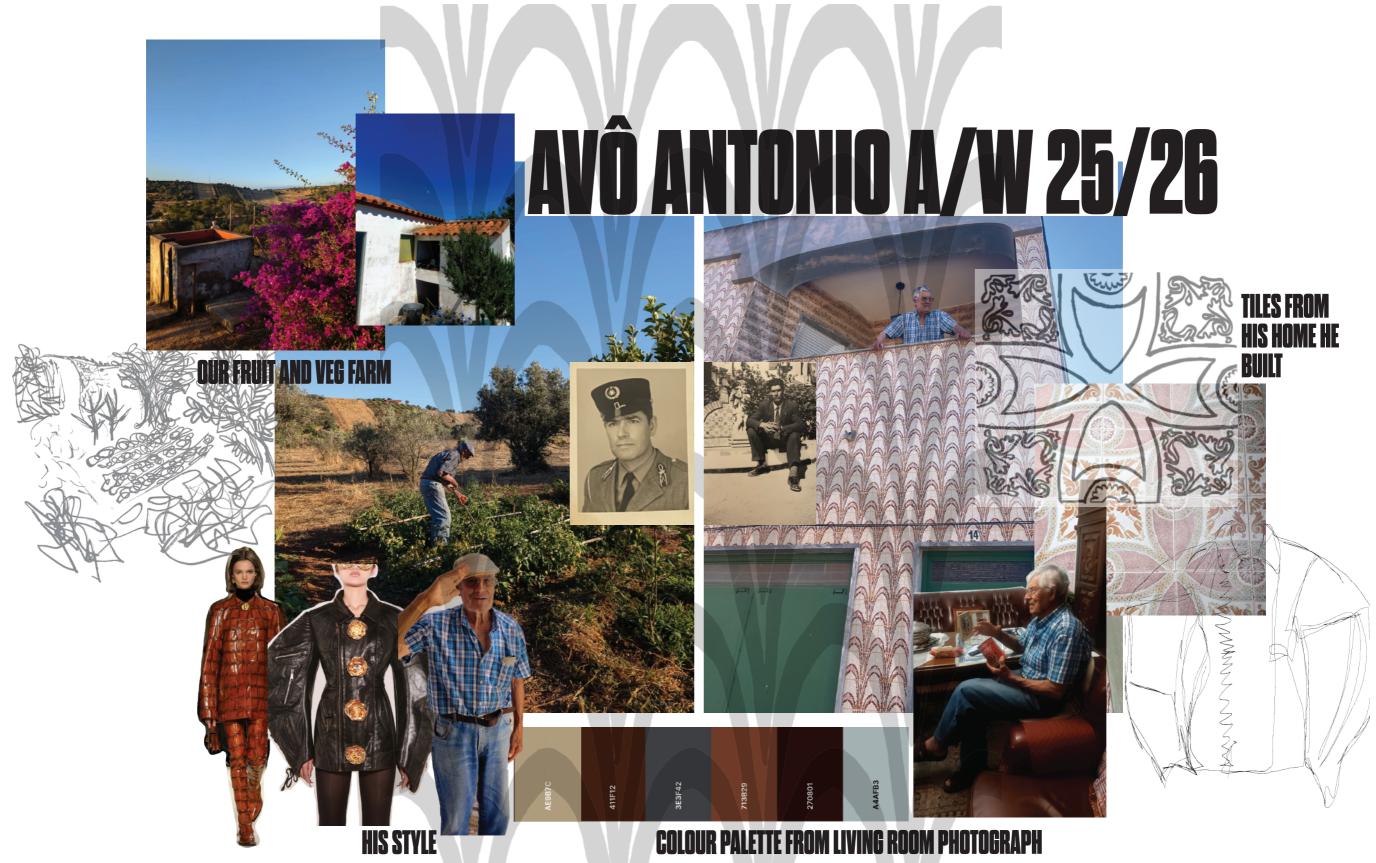
For this blazer, I wanted to reflect my grandfather's hardworking spirit through a garment that combines function and elegance. The blazer's pockets, doubled for extra storage, are inspired by the shape of his denim jeans pockets. Flat-felled seams echo the durability and hard-wearing nature of his work clothes. The silhouette, featuring a fitted waist and exagger+ ated balloon sleeves, draws influence from Schiaparelli's couture, blending tradition with module of the property of the prop

Leather plays a central role in my piece. I chose cow leather scraps sourced from a local upholsterer, ensuring the project remains sustainable while allowing me to explore new leatherworking techniques. The leather elements are inspired by the dark oak furniture my grandfather owned and by Chesterfield sofas, connecting my design to both heritage and material

One of the most meaningful details in my blazer is the leather sleeve moulding, inspired by the architectural tiles on the exterior of my grandfather's 1970s-built home. I replicated the arches from these tiles and incorporated them into the sleeve design, while the floor tiles inside the house were etched into denim for the lining. This felt poetic — exterior tiles on the outside, interior tiles hidden inside — symbolising the duality of heritage and personal n a r r a t i v e

Though the creative journey wasn't without challenges, I embraced the process whole+heartedly. Even when the blazer wasn't fully finished before my photoshoot, I pushed ahead, capturing imagery rooted in my story and summer memories in Portugal. Embracing imperfection added authenticity to the final piece.

After returning from the shoot, I completed the finishing touches, subtly integrating the tile motifs into the front bodice and back panels. Hardware details, including rivets and a braces clasp closure, as well as fine detailing around the collar and pockets, contribute to a modern "quiet luxury" aesthetic, aligning with current trends while honouring traditional c r a f t



My avô is an incredible man who has always inspired me. In the 1970s, he built his own home, bringing materials back from Germany. Portugal is renowned for its beautiful hand-painted azulejos tiles, which decorate streets and buildings across the country. My avô's house is completely covered in these tiles, and I felt compelled to incorporate their unique patterns and colours into my design development.

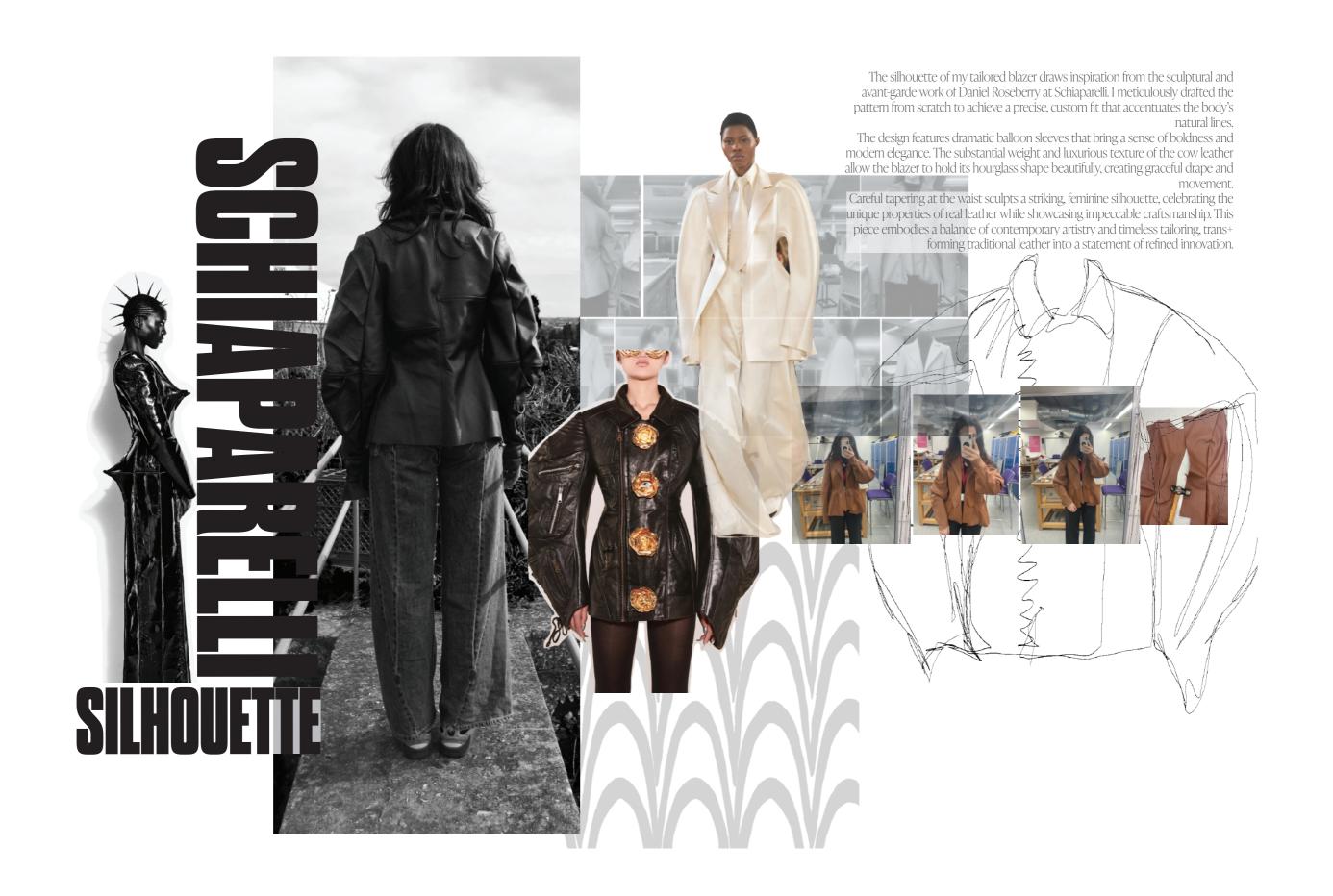
Inside his home, dark, heavy furniture and classic Chesterfield sofas create a rich, tactile environment, which led me to explore working with leather for my designs. I was also deeply inspired by the innovative leather craftsmanship of Daniel Roseberry for Schiaparelli, which influenced both my silhouettes and leather experimentation.

Beyond architecture and interiors, my avô's life as a farmer continues to shape my creative vision. At 89, he still works tirelessly on our family's fruit and vegetable farm in Odiaxere, a village in the Algarve where there is no Wi-Fi or modern distractions. Each summer, I join him there to help plant, water, and pick produce for the morning markets. The farm is an oasis and a place where I escape the fast pace of life in the UK.

For the bodice, I used a soldering iron to melt subtle tile motifs into the leather surface. These details are understated but catch the light beautifully, creating a sense of quiet luxury and adding depth to the piece.



My jacket is heavily inspired by my avô's style, particularly his denim jeans. My blazer design incorporates many details drawn from his clothing, including the shape and construction of his pockets. As a design feature influenced by denim, I chose to use flat-felled seams throughout the blazer. This technique not only references traditional jeans construction but also adds significant strength and durability to the leather, ensuring the jacket will last for years.

Creating a timeless piece was extremely important to me. I believe in making garments that are durable, long-lasting, and crafted with exceptional quality so they can be treasured forever. To reinforce this commitment, I sewed the entire jacket using heavy-duty denim thread. This choice serves both a practical and aesthetic purpose, adding strength while introducing a beautiful copper shine that complements the rivets and the braces fastening.

The braces clasp I used as the front closure is another element inspired by my avô's style, bringing a personal and meaningful touch to the design.

The lining of the jacket is one of my favourite details. The front and side lining panels are made from denim etched with patterns of my avô's interior tiles. I love the concept of having his exterior tiles represented on the outside of the jacket and his interior tiles reflected on the inside. I also included an interior jetted pocket, adding extra utility and a touch of classic tailored blazer craftsmanship.
